Message from the CEO & Chair

2023 was a challenging year for anybody who received or was already living with a cancer diagnosis. The need for our services therefore was more important than ever. Thankfully we remained a stalwart support for anyone who came to us for help as we continued to expand and innovate our services to best meet their needs. In 2023 we provided practical and emotional support to nearly 2,850 people whether in-person at our residential lodge and cancer support centres or remotely through our online cancer awareness and support programmes.

Our Support Centres in Galway and Letterkenny continued to provide in person and remote psychological and psychosocial support to patients of all ages and their families. In total 1,486 clients availed of 9,942 sessions with support centre staff, a 10% increase in the number of sessions over 2022. As in past years we continued to deliver a hugely valued Psycho-Oncology programme for in-hospital cancer patients. In 2023 our clinical psychology team, attended 142 patients providing support to them over approximately 300 sessions.

Inis Aoibhinn, our thirty-three bedroom lodge on the grounds of University Hospital Galway, saw an increase of 10% in the number of patients we catered for, with 371 patients staying with us during their radiotherapy treatment. Our free bus service which runs weekly between Co. Mayo and Inis Aoibhinn remains crucially important to patients and their families. The service was used by 107 people in 2023

which is a 30% increase over 2022, clearly demonstrating the need for the service and its value to our community.

Funding the ever-increasing demand for our services remains challenging. Fortunately, our fundraising activity remained strong, and overall the charity's income remained similar to the previous year at €2.26m. University Hospital Galway (UHG) contributed €650,000 towards the operating costs of Inis Aoibhinn and we acknowledge this ongoing financial support, without which our residential service could not operate. We are also grateful to the National Cancer Support Programme (NCCP) who provided funding for our Cancer Support centres and in 2023 allocated €75,570 for their ongoing development. The hundreds of community events and individual endeavours, along with corporate sponsorship and the myriad individual donations we benefited from this year raised over €1m for us. We thank everyone who contributed to this total. Every event and penny collected is important and without this amazing level of support we cannot do the work we do. A key challenge our charity faces moving forward is growing our income to sustain and expand our range of services. We need to bridge our annual funding gap, which arises from our commitment to providing these essential support services free of charge to an increasing number of people who need them.

In summary, 2023 proved to be another year filled with challenges yet also marked by

significant rewards for our organisation. With a continual rise in the number of individuals seeking assistance at our centres each year, it remains vital that we persistently broaden our services to accommodate this growing demand, though we acknowledge it will be an ongoing challenge to fund this. Thanks to the unwavering dedication of our team members and the generous support from our community, we were able again to go above and beyond to aid all those who relied on our assistance throughout 2023. As always, we extend our heartfelt gratitude to everyone whose contributions make the provision of our services possible.

Galway Cancer Support Centre

The support centre had a busy year in 2023. With an ever increasing number of cancer survivors, over 700 patients and family members attended our centre for the first time. In total over, 1,130 people availed of our services making over 8,400 visits to the centre.

The scope of our services has always evolved and last year this included more of a focus on group support. We have several support groups on offer ranging from specific cancer types, e.g. prostate, multiple myeloma and gynaecological cancers as well as occasional workshops such as craft classes. This year saw the introduction of a very successful online grief webinar series focusing on different aspects of coping with grief. These took place once per month and were well attended.

A key focus during the year was the launch of a significant Cancer-Rehabilitation programme to help patients in restoring their physical function and strength so that they can maintain optimal health and healthy lifestyle behaviours. This included an upgrade to our gym facility in the support centre as well as hiring an exercise physiologist to develop and deliver the programmes.

Our children's cancer support services have continued apace as we continuously look for better ways to support them through such a difficult time in their lives. In May 2023 the National Cancer Control Program (NCCP) launched the Model of Care for Psycho-Oncology for Children, Adolescents & Young Adults (CAYA). As the co-chair of the CAYA Psycho-Oncology Working Group I was instrumental in developing this Model of Care

Subsequently we at Cancer Care West have developed a framework whereby CAYA attending the hospital for oncology treatment can be referred to our centre, ensuring strong communications between the clinical and holistic treatment teams. As a result, our team also developed and piloted a



complimentary therapy programme specifically for CAYA and this programme is expected to be fully up and running in 2024.

As well as these groups, we have continued with the three core services of oncology information and advice; psychological counselling and providing clients with the key psychological tools and finally a focus on survivorship courses and interventions for those who are living with cancer as a chronic illness.

I want to thank our staff volunteers and donors who have ensured the continuation of our services through what has been the most challenging time. Also thank you to the CEO and Board of Directors.

And finally to our most important group, the patients and families who use our services, without whom there would be no centre. It continues to be our privilege to help them through their experience of cancer.

THE JOY OF GIVING BACK

Tony Shannon's Story



Tony Shannon has dealt with a lot in his life, particularly when recovering from severe injuries sustained in some accidents which could have left him very incapacitated over the years. Tony does not succumb too easily to injury and pain though and he has always fought his way back to health and fitness with grit and determination. A recent bout with prostate cancer however tested him to the core and more than at any other time in his life Tony really had to dig deep to get through the treatment and get his life back on track. Tony credits Cancer Care West with much of his recovery as he says

"they were hugely instrumental in providing the practical and emotional support I needed to get myself back to where I am now. Without their help I am not sure where I would be."

Tony soon felt that his debt of gratitude to the charity needed to be repaid and he knew he would not rest until he had done so. So two years after his diagnosis and treatment Tony set about doing something for the Cancer Care West, not only to thank them for their help but also to ensure that they continue to be able to help other men like him. Along with his colleagues at Riverside Cycling Club, Tony opted to cycle from Ennistymon to Croagh Patrick in Westport, Co Mayo, (approx 175km) and then climb Croagh Patrick, all in one day.

It's quite amazing that someone who went through what Tony did would be back on a bike and cycling long distances so quickly. It is beyond amazing that Tony was able to do 5 1/2 hours cycling and then climb Croagh Patrick, raising €26,550 for charity along the way (Tony divided this money between Cancer Care West and another charity that supported him, Sláinte an Chláir.) Presenting a cheque to Dr Norma. Jean Murphy and Nurse Martina Hickey of Cancer Care West was a proud moment for Tony but the story will not end there. Tony has a new mission in life and that is to help as many men as possible who develop prostate cancer. Raising money for cancer support charities is only one way of doing that. He also intends to promote the symptoms and encourage men to get checked, to speak out about his experience so others are aware of what can happen and most of all to encourage men to talk about what they are experiencing and to be there to listen to them. We wish him well with his mission and we look forward to seeing a lot more from him in the future.

Cancer Rehabilitation

For people going through or recently finished cancer treatment an exercise regime may not be the first thing on their mind but at Cancer Care West Exercise Physiologist, Alazne Larringa, believes that a specially developed and personalised programme can be of huge benefit for all cancer patients. Working at the purposebuilt gym at Cancer Care West's facility in Westside, Galway, Alazna conducts an individual assessment for each patient who comes to her for help and she then designs an exercise programme to address their specific needs. For many patients their initial regime may be only 10 minutes long, but with the right exercises undertaken for a short period of time it's quite amazing how quickly a patient can re-build muscle, improve their stamina and alleviate the many side-effects of their treatment. Over time the patient builds up their regime, extending the length of the programme, introducing new elements and/or deepening the intensity of the individual moves. Most people see real improvements in pain levels, fatigue and even sleep patterns very quickly. Alongside these general benefits, specific physical problems like Lymphoedema are also alleviated while mental health conditions like depression and anxiety also improve.

For patients who do not live close enough to the gym in Galway, Alazna designs programmes they can undertake from home or from local gyms. They can then reach out to Alazna using remote technology to check on progress and adjust their programme as they gain strength and stamina. Alazna also offers online classes so they can gain some of the benefits of group workouts.

"Formethemost important element of the programme was that it could be tailored to fit my individual needs. I am seventyfive now so, while I am reasonably fit, I cannot do much running and bending especially as I had back surgery some years ag o. I needed something that was designed to challenge me but keep within my limits, while still giving me the benefits I wanted to achieve. My programme at Cancer Care West does iust that."

Donegal Cancer Support Centre

I concluded last year's report with remarks about the ambition of the service here to move forward with a range of group based programs that we felt would contribute to assisting cancer patients.

I'm pleased to begin this report by saying that this ambition has been largely fulfilled and we have enjoyed a considerable expansion of services. Beginning with the tamoxifen support group, this has grown from strength to strength and has become a very firm monthly fixture and well attended session. In addition to this we have also introduced a 'Men's Morning'. and this again has proven to be a very well received support group. Mindful of the needs of cancer patient's loved ones, we introduced a carers support group and again this has been very well received and it has been relatively well attended. We are very grateful to the ongoing referral support of the medical team especially at Letterkenny University Hospital, without whom the prosperity of these groups would not have

Further to the above, we introduced several additional services to the core clinics that have hallmarked our previous years. This includes the introduction of a massage clinic for the first time and patients report really benefiting from this service. Alongside this we have introduced specialist Pilates classes held on Wednesday afternoons, the aim of which is to support physical restoration, core strength and capacity for relaxation. This marks a welcome increase to our profile of complementary therapies regularly offered at the Centre. Our final group addition was the institution of the brain tumor support group which has been held on an ad hoc basis, but we look forward to consolidating this group next year.

As per previous years, this year was not without its sad farewells and we bade adieu to our lovely nurse, Rita Marrin who very generously gave of her time on a voluntary basis to assist us here. We also said goodbye to Marie Scanlon who joined us as a trainee and left as a fully qualified counsellor.



Again, as with previous years, we have also had opportunity to say hello to new members of staff and we welcome onboard, Anna Edwards who is a very experienced psychology clinician and we are very lucky to have her as part of the team going forward.

As our centre in Letterkenny is funded entirely through fundraising efforts, the Donegal Camino event is now a major contributor to the viability of the centre and to the services it provides for so many people in Donegal and surrounding counties. A huge thanks to the event organisors Peggy Stringer, Deirdre McGlone and Noel Cunningham, their army of supporters and of course all those who undertook the Camino challenge in 2023, raising a whopping €85,000 for us. This is an annual event which continues to grow in reputation and importance, that not only raises significant funds for us but also highlights our services through the associated PR driven by Noel and Noreen D-Arcy.

I conclude this report with reiterating my earlier expression of gratitude for the many people who have contributed financially to the ongoing support of the service, especially through various fundraising events . We also extend our gratitude to the board of directors, our Clinical Director Dr Helen Greally and CEO Mr Richard Flaherty for their ongoing support of the service. I also want to say how appreciative I am to my colleagues within the service for their dedication to the patients and especially to Paticia Doherty without whom the service would not run as smoothly and effectively as it does.

FROM THE WILDS OF DONEGAL

Terence Hegarty's Story



The drive from the beautiful Inishowen peninsula to Galway is approximately 300 km and takes nearly four hours. It was not a trip Terence Hegarty expected to be doing on a regular basis, but following a diagnosis of prostate cancer it became a familiar part of his life. Fit and seemingly healthy Terence had no idea this would happen following a regular check-up with his GP. He remembers "I was shocked to learn that the PSA levels in my blood were elevated and further investigation would be required." At this point Terence had no symptoms, was working full time and exercising regularly.

Two weeks later Terence had an MRI scan, followed by a biopsy and his diagnosis was confirmed. Electing to have his treatment in Galway, Terence started his regular trips to his oncologist who determined that surgery to remove his prostate was the best option. Following surgery Terence started working on his recovery with the aim of being back to work and back to his regular fitness routine as soon as possible. "It all happened very fast and after the tests

o work and back to his regular fitness routine as soon as possible. "It all happened very fast and after the tests were complete I had the surgery, which was about 4 months after my initial GP visit. It's hard to get your head around it and I quickly realised that to recover well I needed to work on getting myself mentally fit as well as physically fit."

From the physical perspective Terence commenced a course of physiotherapy specifically designed to help patients recover from cancer treatment. Getting support for his mental health was less obvious but he found just what he needed in Cancer Care West. Terence quickly found that talking to the clinical psychologists at the charity was exactly what he needed to help him put his journey into perspective.

"Sometimes you need a stranger to talk to. Someone who listens as you work through the enormous impact this disease has on your life. I am extremely grateful that Cancer Care West was there for me. It means that now my recovery will be more complete and I can really get on with my life."

Top National Honour

Cancer Care West Named AIBF All-Ireland Champion Charity Of The Year 2023



Cancer Care West was deeply honoured to receive the 2023 AIBF All-Ireland Champion Charity of the Year accreditation. In announcing the award the AIBF Adjudication Board highlighted Cancer Care West's relentless dedication to serving the community and the immeasurable impact they have on the lives of those affected by cancer, both directly and indirectly.

This recognition is a testament to the hard work and commitment of the Cancer Care West staff, Board and volunteers, and the exceptional services that the charity has provided to cancer patients and their families on the West Coast of Ireland for over 30 years.

Inis **Aoibhinn**

Over the previous few years the restrictions of the pandemic meant life at Inis Aoibhinn was slightly less hectic than previous years, as residents were required to avoid unnecessary interaction and the numbers of people accompanying patients and other visitors were kept to a minimum. Thankfully all of that was over in 2023 and life returned to a more normal, hectic pace.

We welcomed 371 radiotherapy patients to the facility, making it the second busiest year ever for residential stays. Coupled with that we also implemented a policy, so that whenever we received requests from families who were looking to stay overnight to be close to a loved one undergoing cancer treatment at University Hospital Galway (UHG), we offered them a room at the lodge if one was available. While this does not happen very often it did mean that 35 families were able to avail of 54 bed nights, with meals provided. This service is hugely appreciated by the families and makes an enormous difference to them at such a difficult time.

Our residents consistently report that while at Inis Aoibhinn one of the highlights for them is the ability to meet and socialise with other people going through treatment. This sense of community has a significant impact on their mental wellbeing which in turn positively impacts their treatment and outcomes. With this in mind we focused on the communal spaces at Inis Aoibhinn this year, enhancing the sitting room and commencing a project to provide increased leisure space for residents in a separate communal room. This work was supported by a grant from the Galway City Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) for which we are very grateful.

We also upgraded 8 bathrooms during the year to accommodate an increasing number of residents with restricted mobility. A big shout out to Bathroom World who supplied the large shower trays and doors, Classic Tiles who supplied the tiles and Galway Paint Company who supplied the paint and labour. All three companies provided their products and services Free-of-charge and we are extremely grateful for their generosity The team at Inis Aoibhinn have,






Inis Aoibhinn Statistics

A SONG IN HER HEART

Christina Doherty's Story



A cancer diagnosis can come at any time in your life and usually comes out of the blue, when least expected. Christina Doherty was preparing for a planned hysterectomy when hers came, after her doctor decided to send her for a mammogram to ensure all was good prior to her surgery. So it was that Christina had her hysterectomy as planned and only a few short weeks later a mastectomy. This was then followed by chemotherapy, radiotherapy, and a course of Herceptin during which she developed heart problems which necessitated the installation of a stent. An awful lot for one person to cope with in a twelve month period.

One bright time for Christina however, in amongst all of her health challenges, was the weeks she spent at Inis Aoibhinn, Cancer Care West's residential facility for patients on radiotherapy. Christina had her treatment in University Hospital Galway five days a week over a period of several

weeks. During this time Cancer Care West provided lodging and meals for Christina and her husband Thomas at Inis

Aoibhinn which is located on the grounds of the hospital. Christina remembers "Tommy and I stayed there for four nights each week travelling home to Foxford for the weekends. Really everything and everyone was so wonderful I could not have been more happy. One of my best memories is of us all gathering in the sitting room for a sing song in the evenings. My husband and I love music and to be able to relieve the stress of the day with a lovely sing along in the evening was a real joy."

Christina and Tommy also availed of the Cancer Care West Mayo bus service and she explained what it meant to her;

"We were picked up every Monday in Foxford and taken to Inis Aoibhinn and then home again on the Friday. Some weeks I had to stop off in Castlebar for other treatment and the bus driver took me right to the door of the hospital. He was so caring and kind. This service is absolutely brilliant and, at a time when things were very tough for me, it really helped a lot."

Christina is doing well post her treatment and glad to be back in Foxford enjoying life and keeping busy with her seventeen grandchildren. Expanding Our Welcome

On Friday 23rd October 2023 Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly opened the Saolta Radiation Oncology Centre at University Hospital Galway (UHG). Located right next door to Cancer Care West's facility, Inis Aoibhinn, the new facility comprises a three-story radiation oncology centre at GUH and provides state of the art treatment for radiotherapy patients in the West of Ireland, improving waiting times and ensuring equal access to cutting edge therapies for patients throughout the country.

Cancer Care West opened an information desk in the new centre so that we can directly support patients who need accommodation while going through their weeks of radiotherapy. The desk is open for 2 hours every day and is staffed by volunteers who are happy to answer all the questions potential Inis Aoibhinn residents might have.

Once again we are delighted to confirm that over €1m was raised on our behalf by our amazing supporters in 2023. This money is the lifeblood of our organisation, ensuring the vital services we provide remain free and available to everyone who comes to us for support.

Our flagship Galway Bay Swim was postponed in July, the wettest July on record, and rescheduled to August 19th but storm Betty arrived on our shores that weekend causing a further delay. Given the massive effort it takes to run this event, these delays were costly on everyone's time and effort, but the team managed the setbacks extremely well and to everyone's relief the event went ahead on XXX and raised just under €150k, the most ever raised by the event.

Our flagship event for our Letterkenny Support Centre is the Donegal Camino. Once again the event proved extremely popular and the participants had a fantastic time as they raised €85k for our charity. Another huge cheque for €22,210 was raised at the second annual Rosie Mc Gauley Memorial Truck and Tractor Run in only its second year in existence, an event that is fast be coming another key annual outing.

While these large events are vital, the hundreds of small events run up and down the region are equally as important as through them over €750k was raised. These events include many individual and heroic efforts such the climb to Everest Base Camp undertaken by Liam McDwyer and the Sea to Summit challenge which saw twelve cyclists cycle from Ennistymon to Croagh Patrick, climb the reek and then cycle back to Ennistymon.

Our thanks to everyone who organised an event or who helped out or participated in one and especially to all the individuals who undertook a personal challenge. Thanks also to everyone who supported these efforts by donating on the day. We especially thank everyone who donates to us through our direct debit facility or through corporate donations. Regular contributions form a reliable funding stream for us and we acknowledge the loyal supporters who have been making these contributions over many years.


GALWAY MAN TICKS EVEREST BASE CAMP OFF HIS BUCKET LIST

In 2024 we will implement the recommendations of the SEAI, in line with ongoing budget restrictions.

The composition of the board is representative of the Medical sector by eminent cancer specialists and of the wider community. The Board of Directors serve in a voluntary capacity and do not receive any remuneration or expenses. Policy decided by the board is implemented by the Cancer Care West Management team. Costs & Funding


Our support for cancer patients and their families in 2023 was made possible through the continued and significant support we receive from our donors and through statutory funding which we receive from the Health Service Executive. In 2023 Cancer Care West received €650,000 from HSE West as a contribution to the operating costs of Inis Aoibhinn.

Our total income for 2022 was €2.020 million. Just over 63% of this came from voluntary fundraising and donations. All of our income is used in support of our mission and goals. Cancer Care West is a not for profit organization and registered charity established as a limited company. The charity is governed by a Board of Directors who serve in a voluntary capacity and who do not receive any remuneration or expenses. Each year the organization undergoes an independent annual audit and files accounts with the Companies Registration office.

The Company is compliant with all provisions of the Charities Governance Code issued by the Charities Regulator and was previously compliant with the now retired Charities Governance Code for Community, Voluntary and Charitable Organisations in Ireland. The Company is also compliant with the 'Guidelines for Charitable Organisations on Fundraising from the Public', issued by the Charities Regulatory Authority.
