Our Mission

Cancer Care West is dedicated to providing support to anyone affected by a cancer diagnosis in a safe, nurturing and accessible environment.

We aim to provide a holistic service that complements medical treatment through the provision of residential accommodation and support services. Patient support is the central focus of everything we do. Our priorities are to equip all those we meet with the practical and emotional support they need to maintain peace of mind and quality of life. Cancer Care West also provides cancer awareness and educational programmes and supports research into patient care.



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I am delighted to speak to you through our first annual report.

Cancer Care West is a west of Ireland charity, dedicated to the support of patients and their families who are going through a cancer journey, or who have been through a cancer journey. We provide this support through our residential facility, located on the grounds of University Hospital Galway, for individuals receiving radiotherapy treatment and through our Cancer Support Centre at Seamus Quirke Road in Galway. We have also provided funds for cancer research at The National University of Ireland Galway. Although Galway based, our residential and support services are available to anyone in Connacht, Clare and Donegal. We have plans to extend our professional psycho-oncology service to regional centres in Donegal, Sligo, Mayo and county Galway from early 2015.

The annual operating cost of the charity is €1.5m. We receive an annual payment from the HSE of €500,000, which means we have to fundraise €1m every year to meet the costs of the services we provide. Our fundraising comes from Cancer Care West organised events, community fundraising and donations. We are deeply grateful to the HSE and to our many and varied donors, fundraisers and volunteers for their support.

The charity has a very strong ethic of governance, compliance and transparency. We produce annual audited accounts; we track, record and receipt all donations no matter how small; and we employ a professional and dedicated fundraising team. All our nursing and counselling staff are professionally trained for their roles. We have a Board of Directors of 21 people made up of medical, academic, financial and other business people who are dedicated to the aims of the charity.

Cancer Care West's services continue to be in high demand, with our residential facility, Inis Aoibhinn, consistently operating at maximum capacity, and our Cancer Support Centre continuing to expand its range of services. During the year we also supported families who have a loved one undergoing long term cancer treatment with their accommodation needs. We continue to provide a vital psycho-oncology service to inpatients at University Hospital Galway and have expanded this service to the Galway Clinic. We also continue to support cancer research and education particularly through the ongoing Cancer Care West Hardiman Fellowships at the National University of Ireland Galway. In 2013, Cancer Care West provided support to over 1,600 people.

The fact that we do not charge for any of our services at Cancer Care West is a source of great pride for all involved in our charity. This is only made possible through the amazing generosity of our donors and fundraisers. Their continued good work has allowed us not just to maintain, but to extend the range of services we offer patients and their families and I would like to thank them all for their contribution.

The continued economic conditions, coupled with the recent controversies attached to certain organisations in the charitable sector makes this a very challenging time for charities. This report clearly outlines how Cancer Care West's funding is spent and the impact it has on the lives of patients and their families. I want to assure you that every cent donated to our charity is audited and accounted for resulting in complete transparency in everything we do.



Inis Aoibhinn

2013 was another busy year for the staff and volunteers at Inis Aoibhinn. We operated at maximum capacity with a total of 324 patients staying with us throughout the year. Our patients travel from all parts of the west and northwest of Ireland – from Donegal in the north to Tipperary in the south and all counties and west coast islands in between. We understand that it is difficult for patients to be away from their homes and families for the 6 - 7 weeks duration of their Radiotherapy treatment, and at Inis Aoibhinn we do all we can to help make the experience of our residents as welcoming and comfortable as possible.

As well as having 24 hour dedicated nursing staff to support our residents during their stay, we encourage patients to avail of the many services and supports available at our Cancer Support Centre, a 10 minute walk from Inis Aoibhinn. There are many social opportunities to meet other residents who are experiencing a similar cancer journey – this year we held a barbeque in our beautiful garden, we had many great nights of entertainment courtesy of the Newport-Westport set dancers and often have informal music and film nights.

I would like to acknowledge the huge commitment of our staff and volunteers and also to say a big thank you to all the patients and family members who continue to support us and stay in touch long after they leave.





Inis Aoibhinn Residents 2013, by county of residence




Inis Aoibhinn Statistics

They say that you never know what lies around the corner.

On February 12th, at 51 years old, my diagnosis of breast cancer was confirmed. On February 26th I underwent a lumpectomy, and thankfully I didn't need to have my breast removed.

When I think back to that time I can't believe the journey that lay ahead of me. I was strong, fit, working full-time and enjoying life to the full. I had booked a holiday to Dubai to visit my youngest daughter and I had twin grandchildren on the way. I was busy and active and found it very difficult to just stop everything and accept that I was ill. The initial shock, the worry and upset experienced by me and my entire family, the effects of chemotherapy and radiotherapy and the loss of my hair were all milestones which were as impactful as they were unexpected. And yet somehow, I found a way to get through the whole experience.

Inis Aoibhinn was a central part of my recovery. It is a place that is geared towards people going through the same trials, a place where residents and staff look beyond the headscarves, the wigs, the anger and the anxiety. A place where we were given independence and respect as individuals despite our cancer. Being at Inis Aoibhinn took tremendous pressure from my husband and family, as they knew I was being cared for professionally, in a personal and nurturing environment - not a cold, faceless clinic. My time at Inis Aoibhinn gave me space to understand what had happened to me and how life post-treatment was going to be. The friends I made in Inis Aoibhinn are ones that I will always remember as we shared such a 'special time' together for six and a half weeks. Despite being from different age groups and parts of the country, we were all united in trying to get ourselves well and encourage others to do their best and look to the future.

The day I had my last radiotherapy treatment I flew to London to visit my eldest daughter and her husband. My daughter went into labour that night and our twin granddaughters were born the next day.

When I think back to Inis Aoibhinn, I remember it not as the place where I was when I was sick; but the place where I began to get well.

Helping Families

Helping families with long-term accommodation in Galway in 2013

We identified, through our own research, a further need for accommodation for families who have a loved one undergoing long term cancer treatment. Since the beginning of the year Cancer Care West has been providing accommodation to families who live outside the Galway region who have a family member undergoing long term cancer treatment. These are the figures relating to this service in 2013:

- Number of families supported: 17
- Total number of nights paid for in B&B/Apartments/Inis Aoibhinn: 325



Cancer Care West Cancer Support Centre

Cancer Care West's Cancer Support Centre, located in Westside, celebrated its fifth anniversary in May 2014. Over that time, it has gone from strength to strength, filling a gap in support services that had been identified for many years in both Galway city and the whole western region. The centre's primary aim is to provide professional practical, psychological and emotional support to cancer patients and their families during and after cancer treatment. The centre is staffed by clinical and counselling psychologists, oncology nurses and a number of professionals with expertise in cancer care.

During 2013, the centre was visited over 6,000 times by almost 1,300 people affected by cancer. Our most popular services include psychological therapy and counselling, oncology information, benefits advice and complementary therapies.

One of the unique aspects of our service is that we are community based, completely free of charge and professionally staffed. All services provided are evidence based and modelled on best international practice.

While our service in Galway city has gone from strength to strength, a regional psycho-oncology service remains one of our primary goals. There are ongoing discussions with the Irish Cancer Society to progress this aim and I am glad to report that we have agreed in principle the broad outline of the service. This envisages a weekly psycho-oncology service in Sligo, Castlebar, Letterkenny and Ballinasloe which will afford cancer patients and their families the same level of professional service available in Galway city. We hope to launch this service in early 2015.



I would like to extend my best wishes to all our patients and their families. I also want to offer my condolences to the families of patients who have died during 2013. Ar dheis De go raibh a nanamacha.



The Cancer Support Centre has been in operation since May 2009. In the past five years, it has been used by over 6,000 people who have used the services over 31,000 times. While our main focus is cancer patients, almost a third of the people who used the service were family members. This is not surprising as there is considerable research to suggest that watching someone you love go through the cancer journey can be as or more stressful as having cancer yourself.



Over the past five years, a number of trends have emerged in terms of cancer support. There is much greater awareness now of the need to treat not just the physical disease of cancer, but also the psychological and emotional impact of the illness. In addition, ongoing concerns such as fatigue post treatment, adjustment and relationship issues and living well post cancer treatment are much more openly discussed than previously. There has also been an increasing use of our various courses, particularly mindfulness intervention for coping with cancer. In addition, support groups are also found to be very useful, especially when treatment is over and the chance to share the story of cancer with other people who have been through a similar experience is very supportive and helpful.





Over the next year, we have ambitious plans to expand and improve our services, not just in Galway city but also throughout the HSE West area. We have just launched a support group for young people living with cancer and later on in the year we will be running a group for young women with breast cancer. We plan to hold our annual patient conference in September. Last year, 55 people attended our one day conference on all aspects of living with cancer and it was a huge success.

During 2013, we offered training to nurses and allied health professionals in supporting patients and families through the cancer experience. This course offers information and training on topics such as managing distress caused by cancer, communication skills, self-care and stress management.

Our model of psycho-oncolgy in the community is enhancing patient care in Galway city and the western region. The core of the model is that it is easily accessible, confidential and free of charge professional services in the communities where people live. It is our hope that we will continue to expand and improve this service.


Cancer Support Centre Clients 2013, by diagnosis

Research

In 2012 Cancer Care West and Galway University Foundation announced a joint fund of €1m to provide fully funded scholarships for ten PhD students at NUI Galway. Five of the fellowships will be known as the Cancer Care West Hardiman Fellowships.

The key aims of the Cancer Care West Hardiman Scholarships are: 1) to support internationally competitive translational research in Cancer Biology and Therapeutics at NUI Galway and University Hospital Galway, which will impact on cancer diagnosis and treatment in the near term; 2) to attract the best graduate students to NUI Galway, to work in translational research in the University's Biomedical Science and Engineering priority research area, focused on the Cancer Biology and Therapeutics research theme; and 3) to enhance the graduate education and training environment at NUI Galway within the state of the art National Centre for Biomedical Engineering Science and the associated Translational and Clinical Research Facilities at University Hospital Galway.

Education and Awareness

PATIENT CONFERENCE

In September 2013, we held our inaugural annual patient conference at the Cancer Support Centre. This was a very successful event, officially opened by Dr Susan O'Reilly, Director of the National Cancer Control Programme. The day was comprised of a keynote address on the emotional impact of living with a cancer diagnosis as well as four workshops, facilitated by staff of the centre, exploring topics such as fatigue, exercise, nutrition and coping with emotions. It was attended by 56 participants, the maximum number we could cater for, though we had 100 applications for places. We plan to run this as an annual event.





CONFERENCES, TALKS AND SEMINARS

Maintaining Nutrition during Cancer Treatment: Heather Miller, a dietician from Nutrica Ireland gave a presentation in January at the Cancer Support Centre.

Incontinence and the Pelvic Floor: Ms Beatrice McGinley, physiotherapist at Galway City Physiotherapy services, presented a talk in April for men who had treatment for prostate cancer.

Blood Cancers - Diagnosis and Treatment: Prof Michael O'Dwyer, Consultant Hematologist gave a very informative public talk in April.

Parents Bereaved by Cancer: Dr Greally presented a talk to Anam Cara, a national bereavement support group.

Minding Yourself after Cancer: Dr Greally presented the keynote address at the annual patient conference day at Beaumont Hospital, Dublin.

Coping with Prostate Cancer: Dr Greally gave a talk and presented a workshop at the prostate cancer conference held in Ballinasloe in May.

Breast Cancer and You: Dr Helen Greally gave a talk for breast cancer patients at the Galway Clinic.

Psycho-Oncology in Practice: Dr Greally presented a seminar on behalf of the National Cancer Control Programm for public health nurses and practice nurses.

COURSES

- Three psycho oncology courses were provided to all grades of staff at University Hospital Galway.
- Four mindfulness courses were completed with 63 participants at the Cancer Support Centre.

OTHER

 Dr Greally was invited to sit on the Survivorship Steering committee of the National Cancer Control Programme whose aim is to develop survivorship care plans for all cancer patients.

SCHOOLS EDUCATION PROGRAMME

 Sharon Fitzpatrick, Fundraising Manager visited 15 primary and post primary schools to talk to students about the services provided by Cancer Care West.



In 2013 Cancer Care West was once again one of the 3 charity partners of the BLUE SEPTEMBER campaign, the annual one month long men's health campaign. The core aims of Blue September are to raise awareness of men's cancers and address the fact that in Ireland, more men are diagnosed with, and die from cancer than women. Blue September also fundraises for men's health programmes.

Blue September is an international men's health campaign and is well established in the USA, Australia and New Zealand. In 2013 VHI Healthcare came on board as sponsor to the campaign.



Where the money goes



Our total income for 2013 was €1.572m. Two thirds of this was derived from voluntary fundraising and donations and we are very fortunate to have an incredibly loyal, committed, and growing network of supporters who continue to help us.
